


We currently have a central dispute on the protected compliment. We were not in agreement with how many permanent members are part of the protected compliment. We are awaiting a date to discuss this dispute.

We are also aware of the staffing issues arising all across the board. There are not enough supply or even permanent staff to ensure shifts are covered. We are continuously taking these complaints to HR. They tell us they have been going to job fairs to try to get people to join the school board. Sadly so far, I have not seen any difference. Being a Forbe's top employer hasn't seemed to help with that.

As you know, we have filed for conciliation for bargaining. We have been assigned a conciliator and are awaiting dates. I understand how frustrating waiting for the pay increase and back pay is, but we need to stand together for a better collective agreement. We have made some gains, but it is not enough. Please remember, you are the union. The bargaining team can sit at the table and bargain for improvements, but we need the backing of all the members to show our employer we are united and will stand together.

We are also in the process of bargaining for STEO. We have had some dates to discuss the needs of CUPE 5678-1. We bargain again this week, and another date next week if it is needed.

DAY OF MOURNING

Now an international observance as a day of mourning for workers killed, injured or made ill by their job, the declaration of April 28th as the Day of Mourning began here in Canada. In 1984, unions in Sudbury, Ontario, adopted the day as one to publicly acknowledge workplace injuries, illnesses, and deaths. The Canadian Labour Congress held its first day of remembrance in 1986. The date of April 28th was chosen to reflect the anniversary of the day Ontario

passed the Workers' Compensation Act in 1914.

On April 28, 1991, following passage of an Act in Parliament, Canada recognized its first National Day of Mourning for Persons Killed or Injured in the Workplace: a day where flags fly at half-mast, and we hold ceremonies across the country to recognize the lives needlessly lost, and the tremendous suffering of those left in the wake of workplace tragedy. In the years since, more than 100 other countries have also adopted the observance known widely as Workers' Memorial Day.

On Friday, April 28th, 2023 we stand together with the world's workers to remember:

- All those killed on the job, and those suffering workplace illness or injuries.
- Children left parentless, and families facing hardship.
- Young workers, who are killed or injured at a much higher rate.
- Women, whose hazards are often unrecognized or ignored.
- The working wounded denied fair compensation.

Because unions help create new laws and protections, we:

- Demand the enforcement of health and safety laws.
- Denounce those who place profits before workers' health.
- Proclaim our right to safe workplaces and respect on the job.
- Vow that "an injury to one is an injury to all".

OSBCU – Ontario School Board Council of Unions Convention, Toronto

Some of the professional development that was offered included; Leading as a Team, Conflict Ready Executive, Understanding Mental Health, Ally Skills for Stewards, Joint Job Evaluation, Building Membership Lists, How to Protect your FTE Number, Sick Leave, Diverse Workforce, Working with your Trustees, Violence Health and Safety, Cost Share, Public Speaking, Maintaining Member Engagement, and comparing the ESA to our CA.


We participated in many calls to action to support working groups who are also front-line workers. We attended a rally at Queens Park to support health care for all, as the Ford Government continues to lay attacks on the public sector.

Much of our conversation and learning was geared towards maintaining our levels of engagement as a union, from now until the next round and bargaining, and moving forward.



We celebrated that as a collective, CUPE Education Workers killed Bill 28 in record time and did not back down to the unfair collective agreement that was being forced on us! Thank you to our CUPE 5678 team for the opportunity to attend this convention.

Jack Layton Progress Prize



The late Jack Layton served as leader of the New Democratic Party of Canada from 2003 to 2011, when he became the Leader of the Official Opposition.

During his long career in public service, Layton was fond of a great campaign. Whether working with local environmentalists to erect a windmill on the Lake Ontario shore, co-founding the White Ribbon campaign for gender justice, shining a light on the scourge of homelessness, or running in multiple political campaigns at the municipal and federal levels, Layton loved nothing more than the creation of empowering efforts to rally people around a common cause.

In his honour, and in partnership with Olivia Chow, the Jack Layton Progress Prize is awarded annually to an individual or organization who has run a particularly noteworthy political or issue campaign reflecting the ideals exemplified by Layton, including justice, sustainability and democracy.

Qualifications

- Commitment to progressive/social democratic values and movement
- Primary responsibility for executing the campaign in question over the previous year or exemplary movement building gaining significant momentum in the previous year
- Vision, engagement, imagination, and effectiveness as an individual or organizational leader, including representing and/or engaging the diversity of Canada

As a result of their hard work and perseverance the Ontario School Board Council of Unions (OSBCU) and the 55,000 Education Workers of Ontario were recognized by the presentation of the 2023 Jack Layton Progress Prize.

CUPE Ontario and the OSBCU took on the fight back against the anti-labour stance taken by Doug Ford and galvanized the labour movement across the country. Those workers walked off the job, in defiance of the Conservative governments back to work legislation.
